
Week 2

Jesus Teaches Us the Our Father

When Jesus prayed to his Father, he sometimes used the word Abba. Abba is a word meaning "daddy" in the language Jesus spoke. It is a word that showed how much children trusted a parent. It showed they knew that the parent loved them.

One day Jesus' disciples were with him when he was praying. When he was finished, they asked Jesus to teach them to pray. Jesus said, "When you pray, say, 'Our Father'" (based on Matthew 6:9).

We call the prayer that Jesus taught the disciples the Lord's Prayer, or the Our Father. In this prayer we call God "Abba," our own Father.

Faith-Filled People

Teresa of the Andes Saint Teresa of the Andes was a religious sister who lived in Chile. She lived in a monastery and devoted her life to prayer. Pope John Paul II named her a patron saint for young people. The Church celebrates the feast day of Saint Teresa of the Andes on July 13.

The Prayer of Jesus

When Jesus was on earth, he often spent time with God his Father in prayer. He prayed when he began his work on earth. He prayed when he chose his disciples. On the night before he died, Jesus prayed with his disciples at the Last Supper.

When Jesus was dying on the cross, he prayed,

"Father, forgive them. They do not know what they are doing." Just before he died, Jesus said, "Father, I give myself to you." Based on Luke 23:34, 46

All Jesus' prayers show how much he trusts his Father. Trust is believing that a person loves us and will always be good and kind to us.

Jesus showed he trusted God the Father. Name some of the ways that you show your trust in God.

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Praying Alone and with Others

Jesus often left his disciples and went off to be alone with his Father. We, like Jesus, pray this way too. We enjoy being alone with God in prayer. We call this **personal prayer**.

Jesus also prayed with other people. Jesus prayed with people in

Nazareth. He prayed with people in the Temple in Jerusalem. Praying with others is called **public prayer**. We pray this way too. We pray with our family at home. We pray with our Church community at Mass and at other times.

A People of Prayer

The Catholic Church uses many objects that help us pray. The crucifix reminds us that Jesus died for us and loves us. Lighted candles remind us that Jesus was raised from the dead. Statues of Joseph, of Mary, and of the other saints remind us that we belong to a community of people on earth and in heaven.



All these things are sacramentals. They help us raise our minds and hearts to God in prayer.

Churches

Churches are sometimes called "houses of prayer." They are also called "houses of God." We gather in our church to pray together and to pray alone. Our parish church reminds us that the followers of Jesus are a people of prayer.

With My Family

This Week . . .

In chapter 23, "Jesus Teaches Us to Pray," your child learned about the prayer of Jesus and that Jesus taught us to pray. With trust, Jesus shared his thoughts and feelings with his Father. Jesus prayed for himself and for others. When his disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, he taught them to pray, "Our Father..." When we pray to God our Father, we pray with childlike trust and address God as Abba. We pray as children reaching out to parents who they know love them with a love that knows no limits.
